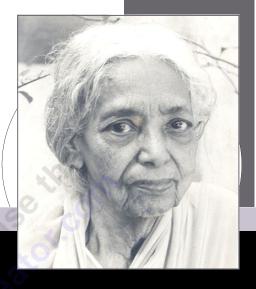

The personality

E K Janaki Ammal was a renowned botanist and plant cytologist who made significant contributions to genetics, evolution, phytogeography and ethno-botany.

Padma Sri Edavaleth Kakkat Janaki Ammal (1897-1984) is the first Indian Woman to obtain Doctorate in Science. She played a significant role in shaping plant genetics and

dian nation. Dr. Janaki Ammal aimed to contribute to a grand history of human cultural evolution.

Daughter of Tellicherry (Thalassery)

Janaki Ammal was born in Tellichery, Kerala, in a cultured middle class family on 4th November 1897. Ammal must have been born with a passion for plants. She obtained her Master's degree in 1925 at the University of Michigan in USA and was the first Oriental Barbour Fellow where she obtained her DSc in1931. During 1940–45 she

worked as Assistant Cytologist at the John Innes Horticultural Institution in London. Invited by the then Prime Minister of India, Jawaharlal Nehru, to reorganize the Botanical Survey of India (BSI), she returned to India in 1951.

Ammal was thoroughly Indian in attire and habits, and Gandhian in her lifestyle remaining single.

The Government of India conferred the Padma Sri on her in 1977.

JANAKI AMMAI NATIONAL AWARD FOR TAXONOMY

In order to encourage work of excellence in taxonomy and also to encourage young students and scholars to work in this science, the Ministry of Environment & Forests has instituted a National Award in Taxonomy named after the late Prof. E.K. Janaki Ammal. This award carries a cash prize of Rs.1,00,000/- and a citation

JANAKI AMMAL HERBARIUM

Named after E K Janaki Ammal, the herbarium at the RRL, Jammu, houses 25,000 species taken from all over India. These include specimens collected even prior to 1935. The collections represent mostly the areas of Jammu and Kashmir and some parts of Himachal Pradesh.
